

# ST. MATTHEW LUTHERAN CHURCH

112 years proclaiming Christ in Bridgeland! By Rev. Markus Zeuch



The week before Easter is called Holy Week. Our Lenten preparation and repentance deepens as we focus on the events of Jesus' life from His entrance into Jerusalem until His death on the cross and burial in the garden tomb.

Palm Sunday, the first day if the Holy Week, commemorates the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem (Matthew 21: 1-11). Because the complete account of the Lord's Passion from Matthew, Mark, or Luke is often read, this Sunday is also called the Sunday of the Passion.

On Holy (Maundy) Thursday, the church gives thanks to Jesus for the institution of His supper. This is a feast day, and the colour used to decorate the church is white. The Holy Thursday service closes with the stripping of the altar. This reminds us of how our Lord stripped to the waist to wash His disciples' feet – and how He was stripped and beaten before His crucifixion.

Good Friday is the most solemn of all days in the Christian Church; yet a not of joy remains, as the title of the day indicates. On Good Friday, as we remember that on account of our sin the Lord was crucified and died, we give joyful thanks to God that all sin and God's wrath over sin falls on Jesus and not on us, and that by His grace we receive the benefit of this most sacrificial act.


### During Holy Week, we worship our Lord, who gave His life for us.

Readings for the Holy Week: Matth 26-27 Mark 14-15 Luke 22-23 John 18-19

### **Holy Week practices and traditions:**

- In many churches, the colour for Holy Week continues to be violet. In others, the colour is scarlet, a deep blood red. Scarlet reminds us of Jesus' blood shed as He suffered and died for our sins.
- Many congregations read the Passion narrative during special midweek services of Lent. But on each day of Holy Week, the whole story of the events leading to Jesus' death and burial is read from a single Gospel.

- While in Lent, we forgo singing the joyous Alleluia response, and we do not sing the Gloria in Excelsis. In Holy Week, we go a step further as we give up singing the Gloria Patri – our joyous praise to the Trinity at the end of all the Psalms we use in worship. Omitting these joyous words makes our worship even more reserved and somber.
- Many churches observe Holy Week by gathering for special services throughout the week.

## SPEAKING OF HISTORY, HAPPY ANNIVERSARY!


April is actually considered the month of our anniversary! St. Matthew is celebrating 112 years of blessings! These are the highlights of **our history for April**:

### FROM THE CHURCH OFFICE

### **ENVELOPE SECRETARY POSITION BECOMING VACANT MAY 31st 2025.**

The PPC is looking to fill the envelope secretary position. Please see the description for the by-laws below. The time commitment is about 1 hour a week in the church office doing data entry from the weekly offering summary prepared by the counters. Monthly PPC meetings the last Thursday

of the month via Zoom and quarterly congregational meetings. Printing and preparation of the year-end tax receipts is about a half day as well as preparation of the yearly envelopes in the early December. Anyone interested in volunteering for this vital position or if you have any questions, please speak with one of the current PPC members.

- a. Shall order offering envelopes each year by June for the following year. These are to be distributed to the Congregation starting the first of December and as required.
- b. Record all Congregational monies received through offering envelopes and prepare individual statements for all contributions received during each calendar year.
- c. Notify the Board of Stewardship and the Pastor concerning contributions by non-members.

**Easter: It's Not About the Bunny...It's About the Lamb.**

### TO OUR GERMAN-SPEAKING CONGREGATION:

Die Geschichte des Lammes

Bibelstellen: 1. Mose 22,7.8; 2. Mose 12,5; Jesaja 53,7; Johannes 1,36; 1. Petrus 1,19; Apostelgeschichte 8,32.35; Offenbarung 5,6; 19,7; 21,9.23,



Die Geschichte des Lammes Gottes durchzieht die Bibel wie ein roter Faden. Schon mit den Röcken von Fell bei Adam und Eva zeigt Gott, dass ein stellvertretendes Opfer sterben muss, um die Sünde zu bedecken. Abel schloss daraus im Glauben, dass man Gott nur auf der Grundlage eines blutigen Opfers nahen kann.

Isaak stellt dann auf dem Weg nach Morija die entscheidende Frage: "Wo ist das Schaf (o. Lamm) zum Brandopfer?", und Abraham gibt die weise Antwort: "Gott wird sich ersehen das Schaf (o. Lamm) zum Brandopfer" (1. Mo 22,7.8). Doch blieb die

Frage Isaaks die ganze Zeit des Alten Testaments hindurch unbeantwortet. Was aber die Geschichte Isaaks bereits andeutet: Das Opfer wird nicht ein Tier sein, sondern ein Mensch.

Durch die Anweisungen zum Passah und die Prophezeiung Jesajas kamen noch weitere Kriterien hinzu, die das Opferlamm erfüllen musste: Es musste ein "Lamm ohne Fehl" sein, und dieses Lamm musste "stumm sein vor seinen Scherern" – ein stiller Dulder (2. Mo 12,5; Jes 53,7).

Johannes der Täufer schließlich gibt die wunderbare Antwort auf die Frage Isaaks: "Hinblickend auf *Jesus*, der da wandelte, spricht er: Siehe, das Lamm Gottes" (Joh

1,36). Ein gewaltiger Moment: Das Lamm Gottes tritt auf der Erde in Erscheinung. Aber war es auch das Lamm ohne Fehl? Die Frage beantwortet Petrus: "ohne Fehl und ohne Flecken" (1. Pet 1,19). Und wie sieht es damit aus, dass es ein stiller Dulder sein musste? Die Antwort gibt Philippus. Denn es war gerade die Stelle aus Jesaja 53, die der Kämmerer las, als Philippus hinzutrat: "Und anfangend von dieser Schrift verkündigte er ihm das Evangelium von Jesus" (Apg 8,32.35).

Viele Lämmer waren im Alten Testament geschlachtet worden. Keins davon war das Lamm Gottes. Auf Golgatha kam dann der Moment, an dem Gott gleichsam mit seinem eigenen Lamm an den Altar trat. Es war sein Sohn, sein einziger, den Er lieb hatte, den Er dort für fremde Schuld opferte.

Wundert es uns, dass die nächste Szene, in der wir das Lamm wiederfinden, der Himmel ist? Dort steht das Lamm inmitten des Thrones Gottes auf dem höchsten Platz der Ehre. Es kommt und nimmt "das Buch" aus der Rechten dessen, der auf dem Thron sitzt. Es ist niemand anderes als der Herr Jesus, der durch seinen Opfertod das Recht erworben hat, als Mensch die Zügel der Regierung dieser Welt aus der Hand Gottes zu empfangen, um die Welt (durch Gericht) wieder in Übereinstimmung mit Gott zu bringen und dann in Gerechtigkeit und Frieden zu regieren. Die einsichtigen Ältesten fallen nieder und beten an – überwältigt von dem Anblick dieses würdigen Ausführers der Ratschlüsse Gottes mit dieser Erde: das Lamm wie geschlachtet.

Es folgen noch zwei weitere bedeutende Szenen in Offenbarung 19 und 21, die von der Herrlichkeit des Herrn Jesus als Lamm Gottes zeugen: die Hochzeit des Lammes und die Beschreibung der Braut des Lammes in dem Bild der heiligen Stadt, die keine Sonne braucht, weil das Lamm Gottes diese Stadt erleuchtet durch die Ausstrahlung der Herrlichkeit Gottes.
