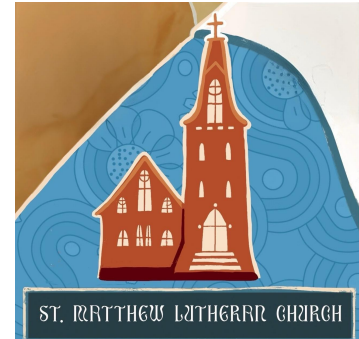

112 years proclaiming Christ in Bridgeland

Easter is not merely a one-day celebration; it is a fifty-day season from the Day of the Resurrection of Our Lord to the Day of Pentecost. This extended season – one seventh of the year – is a victory celebration, a time for all Christians to proclaim boldly their faith in a risen and victorious Saviour.

The first celebration of Easter is the Easter Vigil, the evening of Holy Saturday. The Vigil includes a service of light, in which fire symbolizes Jesus as the light of the world. The service is designed to take the Christian from the solemnity of Good Friday to the predawn joy of Easter.

Easter is the richest and most lavishly celebrated festival of the Church Year. Congregations may hold a sunrise service, commemorating the surprise of the women visiting the empty tomb of Christ, as well as services that celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ. While not as lavish, this joyous and celebratory tone echoes down through the Sundays of the Easter season.

Forty days after Easter, the church celebrates the Ascension of Our Lord, who ascended into heaven not only as God but also as man. The final Sunday of the Easter season, celebrated as Pentecost, was adopted by early Christians to commemorate the first great harvest of believers for Christ. Thus, Pentecost is the birthday of the Christian Church, as the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples, and they gave their compelling witness about the resurrected Lord. The colour of the Day of Pentecost is red, representing fire and blood. Red recalls the tongues of fire received on the first Pentecost and the martyrs who shed their blood for the faith.

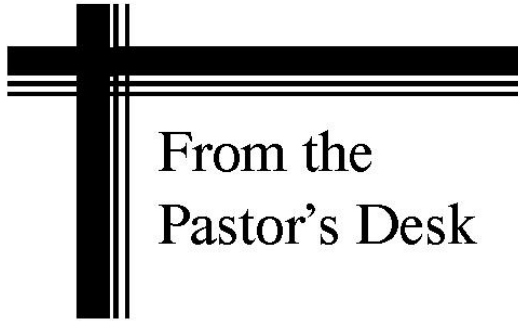
During Easter, we rejoice in our salvation.

Readings for the season: Matthew 28, Luke 24, John 12:24-25; 20:1-29; 21:1-14

EASTER PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS

- The colours of Easter are white and gold. White, the colour of our Lord's holiness, is everywhere on Easter, from the paraments and vestments to the traditional Easter lilies. Gold decorations remind us that our resurrection life in Christ is precious and eternal.
- After a long absence in Lent, Alleluia returns at Easter and is heard everywhere in the propers appointed for the weeks after Easter. Also, the joyous Hymn of Praise and the Gloria Patri return and are sung as part of the liturgy once again.
- During the Easter season, we greet one another with a special Easter greeting and response: "Alleluia! Christ is risen!" "He is risen indeed! Alleluia!"

IN LOVING MEMORY

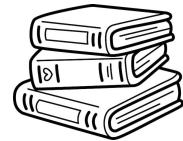
Two faithful members of our congregation have been called to glory recently:


FROM THE CHURCH OFFICE

ENVELOPE SECRETARY POSITION BECOMING VACANT MAY 31ST

The PPC is looking to fill the envelope secretary position. Please see the description for the by-laws below. The time commitment is about 1 hour a week in the church office doing data entry from the weekly offering summary prepared by the counters. Monthly PPC meetings the last Thursday of the month via Zoom and quarterly congregational meetings. Printing and preparation of the year-end tax receipts is about a half day as well as preparation of the yearly envelopes in the early December. Anyone interested in volunteering for this vital position or if you have any questions, please speak with one of the current PPC members.

- a. Shall order offering envelopes each year by June for the following year. These are to be distributed to the Congregation starting the first of December and as required.
- b. Record all Congregational monies received through offering envelopes and prepare individual statements for all contributions received during each calendar year.

Who was he?
The bishop of Alexandria and a champion of Christian orthodoxy.

Did you know?

- He served as a church leader in a time of great controversy and ecclesiastical disagreements.
- At the Council of Nicaea in 325, he defended Christian orthodoxy against those who denied the full divinity of Jesus Christ.
- His enemies had him exiled five times and on two occasions he was almost murdered; yet he remained steadfast and ended his days restored fully to his church responsibilities.

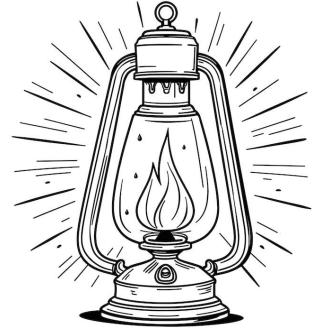

SUGGESTED STEPS IN READING GOD'S WORD

Here are a few helpful steps you may wish to follow as you dig deeper into God's Word.

1. Read the Bible text chosen for the day.
2. Pray for the Holy Spirit to guide your meditation: "Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in Your sight, O Lord, my Rock and my Redeemer" (Psalm 19:14).
3. Read an introduction to the book of the Bible you will be reading. The introductions in the Concordia Self-Study Bible and the Lutheran Study Bible are good resources in this regard.
4. Consider the various contexts surrounding the text or book being read. Ask: what can the geographical, historical, social political, textual, and grammatical contexts tell you about the text?
5. Consider the genre of the text: Is it a story, comparison, allegory, parable, prayer, poem, sermon, or vision? Who is the writer? Who is speaking in the text? Examine sentences, paragraphs, period, word meaning, and so forth.
6. Remember the analogy of Scripture (the idea that "Scripture interprets Scripture.") Examine parallel passages and cross-referenced texts in the Old and New Testaments, which speak on the same or related topics, to help shed light on the current text. As time allows, the diligent student wants to dig deeper and deeper into the whole counsel of God revealed in His Word.
7. Summarize the central doctrine of this text, and any false beliefs condemned.
8. Ask: What are some Law and Gospel themes in this text that can be applied to my life? What doctrines is the Holy Spirit teaching me here?
 - a. **Law (Malady):** In what way does the Holy Spirit warn me of my weaknesses and challenges here? What pitfalls is He warning me to avoid? How does the Holy Spirit call me to make a u-turn and repent?
 - b. **Gospel (Remedy):** In what ways in this text does the Holy Spirit point me to God's grace, revealed through Jesus' life, suffering death, and resurrection? How does it point me to Christ and to His comfort for me?
9. Application: What are some encouraging teachings I can take from this text today? How shall I respond to God's Word for me today?
10. Closing prayer.

DIE FREUDE AM HERRN

„Betrübt euch nicht, denn die Freude an dem HERRN ist eure Stärke“ (Nehemia 8,10).

Ermutigung in Zeiten des Niedergangs

Als Nehemia diese Worte an das Volk, das aus der Gefangenschaft zurückgekehrt war, auf dem großen Platz in Jerusalem richtete, war die Mauer gerade wieder aufgebaut worden. Nun hatte sich das Volk versammelt, um das Gesetz zu hören, das Esra und die Leviten ihnen erklärten. Als das Volk das Ausmaß des Niedergangs seines Zeugnisses erkannte, begann es zu trauern und zu weinen. Diese Demütigung war absolut angemessen vor Gott und erinnert uns an Esra und Daniel, die ebenso den traurigen Zustand des Volks bekannten. Doch Nehemia tröstet und ermutigt das Volk mit den Worten: „Betrübt euch nicht, denn die Freude an dem HERRN ist eure Stärke.“

Auch wir leben in einer Zeit des Niedergangs. Vor mehr als zweihundert Jahren ist das Licht des Zeugnisses der Versammlung wiederhergestellt worden. Doch nun scheint es kurz davor zu sein, zu erlöschen. Wir sehen das Böse, wie es sich immer mehr ausbreitet, und haben dabei nur wenig Kraft. Wie kostbar sind da die Ermutigungen aus dem Wort Gottes! Das Wort Gottes kräftigt uns „mit aller Kraft nach der Macht seiner Herrlichkeit, zu allem Ausharren und aller Langmut *mit Freuden*“ (Kol 1,11).

Christus – die Quelle der Freude

Welch ein Glück, den zu kennen, in dem die Kraft liegt und dessen Liebe heute noch genauso groß ist wie damals, als Er sich am Kreuz für uns hingab, um uns zu erretten. Alle, die zu Ihm kommen und ihre Sünden bekennen, empfangen Vergebung und Befreiung.

Dann können sie in der Freude des Heils ausrufen: „Meine Wehklage hast du mir in einen Reigen verwandelt, mein Sacktuch hast du gelöst und mich mit Freude umgürtet“ (Ps 30,12).

Während unseres ganzen Lebenslaufs sind wir die Gegenstände der liebevollen Fürsorge des guten Hirten. Die Segnungen, mit denen Gott uns überschüttet hat, sind unzählbar! Indem wir Frieden mit Gott haben durch unseren Herrn Jesus Christus, haben wir auch Zugang im Glauben zu dieser Gnade, in der wir stehen, und rühmen uns der Hoffnung auf die Herrlichkeit Gottes (Röm 5,1–3). Und wenn wir Leid erleben, dann dürfen wir uns ebenso rühmen, wie es der Psalmist tat: „Du hast Freude in mein Herz gegeben, mehr als zur Zeit, als es viel Korn und Most gab“ (Ps 4,8).

Doch so groß all das auch ist, was Gott uns in seiner Liebe und Gnade geschenkt hat – was unsere Herzen mit Freude erfüllt, ist die Person des Gebers selbst. Allezeit dürfen und sollen wir uns in unserem Herrn freuen (Phil 4,4). Auch in Zeiten des Verfalls dürfen wir die „Vortrefflichkeit der Erkenntnis Christi Jesu“ suchen (Phil 3,8). Von unserem Herrn lesen wir: „Fülle von Freuden ist vor deinem Angesicht“ (Ps 16,11). Das galt für die Vergangenheit (s. Ps 21,7) und wird auch in der Zukunft so sein (s. Apg 2,28).

Als Kinder Gottes, die seine Natur besitzen und mit Christus vereint sind, „haben wir Gemeinschaft mit dem Vater und mit seinem Sohn Jesus Christus“ (1. Joh 1,3). Wir rühmen uns in Gott durch unseren Herrn Jesus Christus. In der Gemeinschaft mit Ihm wird unsere Freude vollkommen. Wir dürfen in die Gedanken Gottes eintreten und seine Ratschlüsse der Gnade für uns und für die Herrlichkeit Christi erkennen. Diese Gemeinschaft, diese Beschäftigung mit Christus und allem, was uns in Ihm geschenkt ist, muss unser Herz zur Anbetung bringen.

So ist die Freude am Herrn – diese tiefe Freude, die Gott selbst in unsere Herzen legt – die Quelle der Kraft, die wir für unser Zeugnis und unseren Dienst brauchen, den jeder von uns persönlich und wir alle gemeinsam zu erfüllen haben.
